

ARTS FOR EVERY BODY: RHINELANDER

LEVERAGING THE POWER OF THE ARTS FOR THE WELLBEING OF ALL – IN RHINELANDER

August 15 - September 27 Opening Reception: Thursday, August 15 | 4 - 7 pm

This exhibition tells the story of how our community participated in a nationwide campaign aimed at demonstrating how the arts can lead to healthier people and communities. It all began with a local youth skate park advocacy effort in partnership with ArtStart that grew into a national conversation around cultural engagement and mental wellbeing. One Nation/One Project (ONOP) is the organization that backed this effort, designed to activate the power of the arts to heal our communities. ONOP launched a national advocacy effort around the impact of the arts on our heath called "Arts for Every Body." As a participant, Rhinelander hosted a community-wide Push Against Loneliness event on July 27, 2024, in solidarity with the other 17 sites that participated, which culminated in the unveiling of a public art installation piece.

Our community has spent the past two years collaborating with social service organizations, artists, and residents to create spaces that explore the intersection of arts, skateboarding, and mental health. This exhibition will feature artwork from Rhinelander's process and highlight lead artists Norma Dycus Pennycuff and Witt Siasoco. It highlights how their own artistic practices informed a creative framework for civic engagement, skate park advocacy, and awareness around social isolation. This exhibit tells the story of this meaningful project and shares the artwork created along the way.









ADAM STUART SOLO SHOW

Adam Stuart grew up in a marshy place in the Saginaw Bay area of Michigan. He has a passion for nature that drives his work into areas of sculpture and drawing. Adam primarily works with clay, fibers, and various drawing techniques. His works often revolve around the human body, its experiences in space, and its interactions with other beings and objects. His artwork is playful and



curious, often drifting into realms of absurdity. The imagery he creates also pulls from his experiences as a queer person growing up in a conservative environment, but also how that relates to the delicate ecology of the natural habitats in which he immerses himself.

Adam has taught ceramics classes to adults for over nine years. He achieved his BA at Saginaw Valley State University with honors, Magna cum Laude in 2015. He graduated from Washington State University with an MFA in 2023. He has been an art instructor at Washington State University, Nicolet College, Interlochen Center for the Arts, and Eastern Michigan University in the Fall of 2024. He has taught for non-profit art studios such as Studio 23 The Arts Center, The Artisans at the Dahmen Barn, and Nicolet College Arts and Enrichment program.

Be creative in a relaxed, open ceramics studio with guidance designed to give you hands-on experience working with clay and designing your own pottery. This class is for students comfortable with wheel throwing and previous experience in ceramics. Students will expand on their abilities and will be guided through new independent projects. Functional and sculptural aspects of clay will be explored along with firing, decorating, and glazing processes. Course Fee includes: 25 lbs. of clay, firing, glazing, and the use of studio tools. *Glazing and pick up will be arranged with the instructor at the end of sessions.*

GET INSPIRED

MOVEMENT LAB FOR INQUISITIVE ADULTS

Explore the connection one has with their body and others through a "Movement Lab." Each class will explore a topic through warm-up, improvisation games, and a creative outcome. Based on the movement traditions of contemporary dance explorers including Anna Halprin, JoAnna Mendl Shaw, and Steve Paxton, the class

teaches that everyone can explore their personal movement vocabulary to bring a new lens on how to view the world around and inside of all of us. Approach the class with your own toolkit of experience: dance, theatre arts, or other forms of physical expression. The series will follow different prompts: breath and gasp – the impetus of life; crawl/walk/run – pacing is everything; I am the vessel – know thyself and your personality; spirals – are everywhere; and negative space – it's not just for visual artists.

Students new to the art of ceramics, with little to no experience will learn the basics. This is an instructor-led class on creating ceramic forms using hand-building and wheel throwing techniques, and basic glazing methods. Classes will typically begin with demonstrations followed by instructor support for the remainder of class. Wheel throwing is a physically demanding art form involving bending and hand and arm strength for long lengths. Course Fee includes: 25 lbs of clay, firing, glazing, and the use of studio tools. *Glazing and pick up will be arranged with the instructor at the end of sessions.*

Often, once given a structure and a deadline to come up with the start of a song, most can easily finish at home. Bring a pencil and a notebook, along with a smartphone. Feel free to bring a guitar if you have one but it is not required and come away with the basic elements of a song applicable to any song style or genre.







Armed with relatively new information from the world of neuroscience, you'll learn how to build a cognitive edge and get your brain on your side. This is not a course in "brain games." Instead, you'll learn the basics of what makes your brain tick, your brain's fundamental operating principles, and then we'll dive into some specifics. Learn the mechanics of willpower and how to get more of it; how to use the power of habit to make every day a little easier; how (and why) to talk back to your negative self-talk, and how to manage negative emotions. Dig into the surprising cognitive edge you get by being in a positive mood (and get a bead on how generosity makes you smarter). Finally, learn how to deploy your attention and energy wisely given the limiting realities of the human brain. *Part 1 is not required for Part 2 but is recommended.


